



#### **BIOS OF CAST AND CREW (CONT.)**

Sarah Kinney Knight: After I graduated from Roosevelt High in 1955, I went to work at Sears & Roebucks. Later, I owned and operated Sarah's Grocery at the corner of Tye and Kirkwood for 32 years. I am blessed to have two sons and two daughters. One of my past-times is cooking. I cook a lot of Soul Food, and one of my dishes is Cabbage Casserole. Everyone said it's so so good, especially Tad Porter. I also enjoy going to Church, and sitting on my porch talking to anyone that passes by. You can say I have lived here in The Patch all my life. I moved away twice and always came back.

**Karen Knight Tanner:** My daddy (Vernon) had no limits when it came to me. Yes, I was spoiled by my daddy. He got me a pony named Trixie when we lived at 209 Tye. Later on, he got me a horse named Tinker-bell at 137 Tye.

After graduating from High School, I worked at Atlanta Dairies for over 20 yrs until it closed in 2008. In my twenties, I hung out at my brother Randy's bar and grill on Memorial Dr. called the Crazy Horse. We had some good times. But something amazing happen to me in my late twenties. I started going back to church where my granny (Viola) took me as a child (Friendship Baptist Church). God dealt with my heart and I surrender my life to CHRIST. I got saved on June 8, 1997.

My new life begun. I realized real quick that God has a sense of humor. In my thirties, I thought I would be an old maid and I was okay with that. After all, I was still with my mama, Sarah, had JESUS in my heart and lived in Cabbagetown. But God sent me to a funeral home where I met my wonderful husband, Rick Tanner. You know, when Rick and I got married, I wasn't going to leave my mama, my street, or my Cabbagetown. So Rick moved in. We were all happy and settled.

In my forties, I was barely over the hill and things seem like they couldn't get any better, until we found out Eli's coming. God truly blessed us with an awesome son. Eli is very energetic, sociable and talented. If you've been to Cabbagetown Park, I'm sure you've met my guy — Eli.

**Barbara Panter-Connah:** Barbara and her late husband, Whit Connah, were fortunate to meet Joyce Brookshire through Elise Witt, and enjoyed Joyce's friendship and the pleasure of backing her musically for several years. Barbara currently plays in two bands, The Rosin Sisters and Hair of the Dog, and teaches Harmony Singing at the Frank Hamilton Folk School.

**Walter Harris:** His personal connection to Cabbagetown dates back to the mid-1980s when he was on the staff at the Salvation Army Boys and Girls Club that was located on Carroll Street.

**Jacob Elsas:** Jake has been writing, producing, and directing films since the early 1990s. He has a Bachelor of Arts degree in Russian Language and Literature from Oberlin College, and in 2000, he received a Master of Fine Arts degree in Film/ Video from California Institute of the Arts.

Throughout the 1970s and into the early 1980s, Jake would visit Cabbagetown and Fulton Bag & Cotton Mills, usually with his father Skip Elsas, who worked alongside Esther Lefever at the Patch. Jake has fond childhood memories of the area while it was still very much a mill town, especially of the Cabbagetown Reunion, which was always his favorite event.

He loves Cabbagetown and makes a killer Buttermilk Pie.

**Steve Seachrist:** He plans to continue plumbing the depths and meeting new fellow travelers in this weird and wicked musical stronghold. He'd like to shake your hand and hear your story at Carroll Street Cafe, or anywhere. His favorite food is beer.

**Bradley Van Norman:** BS is always excited to be a part of something the neighborhood has to offer. Volunteering at The Patch Works, the Cabbagetown Reunion, the Cabbagetown Olympics, etc. Almost 7 years into his residency, one could say he loves Cabbagetown so much that's why he went through all of the motions of moving, but only to move from The Stacks to Pearl Street. BS likes tacos. Like, a lot.

**Cherry Del Rosario:** When she's not designing for her day job at the Mellow Mushroom HQ, she is donating her talents to Chomp N Stomp, Atlanta Fringe Festival (where she serves as Design Director), and various other non-profit organizations and festivals in Atlanta. She lives with her fiancé Jason and their two dogs Chomp and Gotham.

Nina Elsas: Transitioning from Kumon to Emory University, Nina became certified as a cardiac medical researcher. In 2013, Nina met Jake while living in Cabbagetown, and they started dating. Soon Nina and Jake would open the first rendition of The Patch Works Art & History Center in 2014. Nina married Jake in 2015 and The Patch Works became their "baby." Nina was finally able to use her art degree and her love of research to become the curator for The Patch Works full-time. One of Nina's favorite quotes is "To remember the past is to live twice." To live in Cabbagetown is to live twice. She likes roast beef and potatoes, stuffed artichokes, and tacos.

#### THE MILL TOWN: FULTON MILL VILLAGE

"Cabbagetown, Atlanta, is a cultural enclave unique in the composition of modern American cities. Some might even call it an anachronism. But it deserves a much deeper look than that. It is an inner-city community made up of people — of southern mountain heritage — who left the land generations ago and came to the city through economic necessity. They came in 1881 to work at the Fulton Mill and brought with them their music, religion, folklore, crafts, food, remedies, strength and moral courage. They worked hard, lived good and bad times, changed — yet stayed the same. The Mill built rows of houses for its workers, provided garbage disposal, security, medical, dental, and other services. The people took this place, shaped it, breathed life into it, made it a community, named it Cabbagetown."

#### THE PLAY

Cabbagetown: 3 Women was adapted by R. Cary Bynum from "actual dialogues originally compiled by the Patch, Inc., and published in Cabbagetown Families, Cabbagetown Food, edited by Pam Durban..." The play profiles the lives of three women, who were long-time residents of Cabbagetown: Lila Mae Brookshire (Joyce Brookshire's mother), Effie Dodd Gray, and Beatrice "Aunt Beadie" Dalton. The original cast included Doris Bucher, Brenda Bynum, and Annette Coleman.

"Live music [was] movingly woven into the performance by Joyce Brookshire, accompanied by Fritz Rauschenberg, with songs she wrote about the families with whom she grew up, and originally were published in Foxfire Records premiere album, North Georgia Mountains." (produced in 1977)

#### THE MUSIC

In the 1970s, when R. Cary Bynum adapted the script for *Cabbagetown: 3 Women*, Joyce Brookshire was the obvious choice for incorporating original music into the play. Joyce was already something of a local legend: the daughter of Lila Brookshire, a social activist, and Cabbagetown's very own singer-songwriter. What might have been perhaps somewhat arbitrary was Mr. Bynum's reason for including two popular hymns, "Will the Circle Be Unbroken" (written by A.P. Carter) and "I'll Fly Away" (written by Albert E. Brumley). Undeniably, both are beautiful, expressive songs and universally loved. In 2019, however, there's an ongoing national discussion that made our choice on which hymns to use a tad more pertinent: today's acknowledgement of Cabbagetown's place in Country Music history.

The fact that a song by A.P. Carter was used in the original productions now carries a certain historical weight. In 1927, the Carter Family was recorded — and subsequently made into a national sensation — by Ralph Peer, whose appreciation for Hillbilly Music began in 1923 when he first recorded Fiddlin' John Carson at 152 Nassau Street in downtown Atlanta. Fiddlin' John was a Cabbagetown resident and former mill worker at Fulton Bag & Cotton Mills. Peer's unexpected success recording Carson's "The Little Old Log Cabin in the Lane" set off a new market in the music industry — a market that was to be labeled as Country Music.

Peermusic, the company that still owns the publishing rights to the works of many of Ralph Peer's earliest celebrity musicians, is allowing us to use, once again, "Will the Circle be Unbroken." And since it seems fitting to maintain the connection, "I'll Fly Away" is being swapped out with "Keep On the Sunny Side," which was also a massive Peer/Carter Family hit.

So, as you listen to the songs popularized by the Carter Family, just remember that a Cabbagetown resident's 1923 recording pioneered the Country Music genre. History is still very much alive in today's society; we just have to remember it's there.

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The Patch Works Art & History Center is a 501(c)(3) community museum cofounded by Nina and Jacob Elsas, who officially established The Patch Works as a Domestic Nonprofit Corporation in the State of Georgia in April 2016.

The mission of The Patch Works is to preserve, sustain, and maintain the historical identity, relevance, and integrity of Atlanta's Cabbagetown — a resurging, 19th-century mill-town community impacted by major urban development — through exhibits of history and local art, and community-based public programs and events. The center strives to tell the numerous local stories: of Fulton Bag and Cotton Mills, Cabbagetown/Fulton Mill Village, and the residents who once lived or currently live in this 19th-century mill town.

The Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association (CNIA) is the volunteer arm of the neighborhood and runs like an HOA. Every resident and business is considered a member of CNIA. Its goal is to provide the residents guidance, covenants, and conditions to properly run the neighborhood, which has been on the National Register of Historic Places since 1976.

The Cabbagetown Initiative Community Development Corporation (CICDC) is a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation. The CICDC (also known as "CI") was established by the Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association in 1999 to oversee the creation of a park in the heart of Cabbagetown. The Cabbagetown community has created an inviting, shared green space that promises to enhance the quality of life in Cabbagetown.

Currently the CICDC, in cooperation with the City of Atlanta, maintains the Cabbagetown Community Center, the Cabbagetown Park, and the Cabbagetown Community Garden. In 2008, the CICDC helped the neighborhood's tornado victims by raising and redistributing relief funds to neighborhood applicants. The CICDC regularly organizes neighborhood public safety, clean-up, and beautification projects, which help combat vandalism and crime. The CICDC manages Chomp and Stomp, Cabbagetown's neighborhood bluegrass and chili festival.




